## Neighborhood Watch Meetings Start in September

The Commonwealth's Neighborhood Watch program is being reorganized. The Association would like to formalize a separate Neighborhood Watch Program for each of the following Commonwealth neighborhoods:

- Sweetwater Section 12
- Commonwealth Estates
- Sutton Park
- Commonwealth Park
- Oxford
- Sutton Forest
- Bridgewater 1,2 ,3, and 4

Meetings for Sweetwater Section 12, Commonwealth Park and Oxford will be scheduled in September and October. Residents in these sections will be notified by mail when their meeting will be held.

The Neighborhood Watch Program will be a joint effort of the Commonwealth Civic Association and the Sugar Land Police Department. Both of these organizations will provide the resources to develop the program but it will require the efforts of the residents to make it successful. Once this program is started it should not take much time to keep it running because most communication will be done by E-mail. Benefits to our community are reduced crime and improved community communications.

Each neighborhood will have an Area Coordinator. Responsibilities of the Area Coordinator are:

- Help organize their neighborhood by dividing the neighborhood into areas of 10 to 12 houses and recruiting a Block Captain in each area.
- Work with the Sugar Land Police to set up safety and security training for the neighborhood.
- Pass on to the Block Captains information about crime events in the neighborhood, alerts or crime prevention information. This will be done primarily by E-mail.
- Set up a monthly meeting with the Block Captains to discuss crime events and crime prevention.

Every 10 to 12 homes will have a Block Captain. The responsibility of the Block Captain will be:

- Collect information about the residents in your neighborhood, such as home and work phone numbers and E-mail address. With permission, this information will be shared with other residents in your block.

- Distribute information to neighbors in your area about crime events in the neighborhood, alerts or crime prevention information. This will be done primarily by E-mail.
- Attend a monthly meeting with the Area Coordinator to discuss crime events and crime prevention.

National Night Out was established to encourage residents to turn on their porch lights and step outside to meet and visit with their neighbors. Getting to know our neighbors is the first step to developing a safe community.

By knowing who lives on your block and which vehicles belong to a residence, you are in a better position to recognize a potentially dangerous situation BEFORE it becomes a problem. If you know the routines of your neighbors, you might actually be aware of the fact that they are out of town and no one should be on the premises, or that they aren't out of town and no one has come outside to retrieve the daily newspapers. It could be YOU that prevents a crime or assists with a medical emergency.

## Antennas and Satellite Dishes

No exterior antennas of any type shall be erected, constructed, placed, or permitted to remain on any house, structure, improvement, or building unless such antenna is located to the rear of the roof ridge line, gable or center line of the principal building.

No freestanding antennas whatsoever shall be placed on any portion of the properties without the prior written consent of the Modifications Committee (MC); provided, however, any freestanding antenna approved by the MC must be located behind the rear wall of the main improvement or building structure and must be screened from view by installation of approved fencing or other screening devices.

No antennas, either freestanding or attached, shall be permitted to extend higher than the roof peak of the structure on which erected, nor shall be erected on a wooden pole.

Satellite dishes larger than 18" must be screened from view.

Where possible, the homeowner is encouraged to place antenna inside the garage's attic space or the house's attic space.

All satellite dishes **MUST** be approved by the MC.

## Wind Turbines

Wind turbine vents must be mounted in the rear portion of the roof so that they are not visible from the front, or above the roof line.

The wind turbine vents must be a color which will blend with the shingle color, or be painted to match the shingle color.

## City of Sugar Land Update

The city of Sugar Land held its' quarterly community rep meeting on July 15. Paula Stansell represented Commonwealth at this informational meeting.

The City stressed the importance of good communication with its citizens and communities. As a result, they have a new service available on-line to assist residents in reporting problems. The new system also tracks progress on the issue and its resolution. The city's new television station, Time Warner channel 16 will be up and running by the time this newsletter is delivered. The station will offer tape delayed city council meetings and a municipal bulletin board with more offerings anticipated in the near future.

The Police Department has indicated a concern about the increase in driveway robberies and home invasions. They are asking that neighborhood watch committees become active in asking residents to watch out for themselves and their neighbors. It is very important to know which vehicles "belong" in your neighborhood and which don't. Get to know your immediate neighbors and their routines. Recognize when an occurrence is "out of the norm".

The Police Department has increased visibility throughout Sugar Land neighborhoods.

The City is working on ways to distribute safety information to the public.

Additionally, the Sugar Land Police Department has a searchable crime information site on their web page. You may access their web site via the City of Sugar Land's web page:

Residents may search crime information by neighborhood. If you have any questions, contact the crime prevention officer for Commonwealth, Officer Ron Foster at 281-75-2579.

The City also announced that they now have reverse 9-1-1 capability for instances of a citywide emergency, (ie. train derailment). They are able to place 1000 calls every 30 seconds to advise residents of any disaster that may affect their neighborhood.

The Police Department announced that the next Citizens Police Academy begins on September 2.



If possible, share your contact information with your neighbors. Know how to reach them during the day should you see something questionable at their home. It is also wise to share the name and phone number of someone who has a key to access your home when you are out of town. One never knows when a plumbing mishap might turn into a flood of water oozing out the front door or the security alarm may malfunction.

The Commonwealth has an active Community Watch Program. If your block does not have a block captain sharing important crime information, please call Tom at 281-265-1734 and volunteer to take the position. The time commitment is minimal, the rewards can be great! (See related article on page one)

The walkways around the Knightsbridge fountains will hopefully be fixed before December 1. The retaining walls failed which resulted in subsidence of the walkways. The sidewalks will be removed, retaining walls repaired, and sidewalks replaced. This project was started last summer and required several engineering studies and a competitive bidding process to develop the most cost effective solution. Repairs will cost approximately \$150,000. The project is being managed and funded by our Levee District.

Every person riding in the front seat of a vehicle must be buckled in. Drivers and passengers 15 years and over who are not wearing a safety belt in the front seat can be ticketed directly. Fines range from \$25 to \$50.

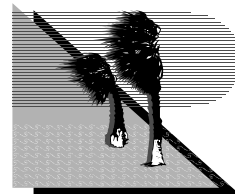
EVERYONE under 17 must be buckled, regardless of where they are seated in the vehicle. Children under 4 years of age or less than 36 inches in height must be in a child seat. The driver can be stopped and ticketed for a safety belt violation. A child safety violation can result in a fine of \$100 - \$200 or mandatory attendance at a traffic safety education class on child safety and safety belts.

**Hurricane season runs from June 1 through November 30. The probability of hurricane development is highest from August through October. Hurricanes are tropical cyclones - storms that rotate counterclockwise with wind speeds in excess of 74 miles per hour. Historically, less than a handful of hurricanes have developed in the Gulf of Mexico but it always helps to know what to expect if a hurricane/tornado hits.**

## Hurricane/Tornado Preparedness Tips

We never think it will happen TO US! But it happens to SOMEONE EVERY YEAR. Better to be safe, than sorry.

If Sugar Land/Fort Bend County are on the "dirty side" of a hurricane, you can expect to experience:

Tornadoes are often spawned by hurricanes and can occur up to 100 miles from the center of the hurricane. Tornadoes bring high winds, broken tree limbs and downed trees. We may experience loss of electricity. There will be flying debris and extensive to catastrophic damage to homes, buildings, cars, etc. A "wet" tornado would include all of the above with excessive amounts of rain. A "dry" tornado could produce hail in addition to the damage from high winds.

Create an emergency plan for your family. Decide where you will meet in the event of a disaster. Have someone in mind who does not live in the vicinity and keep the phone number handy. Use that person as the "point of information" and have all parties check in for information should disaster strike. Make sure all family members are aware of your plan and have that phone number. Prepare a disaster

supply kit with food, water, batteries, a radio, a flashlight, etc. (You can obtain a complete checklist from the City of Sugar Land's web site: [www.sugarlandtx.gov](http://www.sugarlandtx.gov))

Your best defense is preparedness.

### Response to Resident Inquiries

In response to several resident inquiries, Paula Stansell discovered that an agreement has been reached between Fort Bend County, the City of Sugar Land, LID #2, and LID #17 regarding disposition of dirt to be removed as Ditch H (located at Commonwealth Blvd. and University) is cleaned and widened. The dirt is to be excavated from Ditch H between the Brazos River and LID #2's Ditch A outfall channel. This should do much to alleviate the threat of flooding in the event of prolonged torrential rains. This is the beginning of a three-phase project.

Viewing the deer grazing throughout areas of our community enhances the experience of living in The Commonwealth. Unfortunately, we have had several reports of aggression in our four-legged guests. There have been two incidents where a deer has reportedly charged a resident and a third in which an adult was pushed against a fence by an aggressive deer. These incidents occurred in the green space along the bayou behind Commonwealth Elementary School.

Dr. Mitch Lockwood, a wildlife biologist who is the White-tailed Deer Program Leader for Texas Parks and Wildlife was contacted by one of our residents. Dr. Lockwood stated that it is highly unusual that deer would even come within 100 feet of people; normally, when approached, the deer run away. Dr. Lockwood is of the opinion that this behavior is consistent with someone feeding or possibly, handfeeding the deer.

Feeding the deer, will cause the deer to lose their fear of people, increase their numbers to unmanageable levels, and increase unfavorable contact with people in the community. Feed for the deer may also attract other undesirable animals such as feral hogs, opossums, and raccoons.

Additional information provided by Dr. Lockwood includes:

- √ *Annually, in the U.S., deer cause 29,000 injuries, 200 deaths and over a billion dollars in property damage to vehicles.*

- √ *White-tailed deer are the primary hosts for ticks that cause Lyme disease to humans.*
- √ *Annually, deer cause more than \$250 million in damage to residential landscape.*
- √ *Aggressive encounters between people and deer are relatively uncommon, nonetheless, 5-10 people die annually in deer attacks.*

We are fortunate to live in a GREAT neighborhood with multiple pocket parks and open green space for residents to enjoy. HOWEVER, we must remember that deer are wild animals. They can kick with their front and rear hooves. **AVOID CLOSE CONTACT WITH THE DEER.** PLEASE do not feed the deer. Report any incidents with deer to Crest Management (281-579-0761) so the Association can more closely monitor the situation.

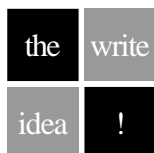
